

Six Arizona middle school youth received God and Church Awards. They








Trevor Crist, a Good Samaritan award winner, participates in a canoe trip in the Quetico Provincial Wilderness Park in Ontario, Canada.

A free DVD to help your church develop or expand its scouting ministries is now available.


